## 7 Steps to Help You Decide What Apps to Allow

Below is a series of questions to help parents decide, in collaboration with kids, when to allow or prevent apps and games. Let them know it is not a checklist resulting in only "yes" or "no", but that there may be settings and parameters that need to be in place before proceeding.

- If you are familiar with the genre or characters, you may get some information just by learning the name of the game.
- Game ratings can help you know what to look out for/ask.
- Gauge the level of violence, interaction with strangers, etc.
- Does this app encourage children to seek "likes"?
- Does it claim to have anonymity or secrecy (e.g. messages selfdestruct)?
- Can players/users track where your child is while using the game/app?
- If yes, can this function be disabled?
- There may be no better way to understand a game/app than using it alongside your child.
- Ask your child to teach you how to play. Be curious: "What happens if I go there? Can you do \_\_\_\_\_?"

- Knowing if friends are using a game/app can be helpful if you know that friend's parent's safety standards.
- If the game was advertised, what does that advertisement highlight?

Basic tiers of chatting:

- No chat function
- Limited chat w/ pre-written messages
- Full chat function w/ friends/approved users
- Full chat function w/ strangers
- Does your child know how to use in-app purchases?
- Do they have access to payment information?
- Do purchases increase risk? (e.g., can you chat on the premium version?)
